Objectives: Students will:

- Create an iGoogle homepage focused specifically on being an informed citizen
- Review a number of online news sites and choose a minimum of FIVE to be "gadgets" on your iGoogle homepage
- Choose gadgets and RSS feeds that are specific to a students' political and civic interests
- Complete a written rationale for each gadget that is on the iGoogle homepage

Directions:

- 1. If you already have a gmail account skip to step TWO. Create a gmail account account-go to http://mail.google.com/ and create a new account (click on the link create an account now).
- 2. Create a new iGoogle homepage by
 - Open your gmail account
 - Click on the link "web" at the top of the page and follow the prompts
- 3. Review news sites, political sites, political satire sites, community sites, special interest sites, etc. Once you find sites you like, make sure they have the ability to add an RSS feed and add them to your page.
- 4. Add/browse gadgets by clicking "add stuff" in the right hand part of your theme banner (upper right hand part of page). There are some good NEWS sites in the google gadgets
- 5. Complete the iGoogle rationale sheet as you go

Grading (30pts):

- iGoogle page (10 pts) must show teacher
- iGoogle gadget rationales (20 points)
